The American Protestant missionary movement in China began in the 1830's, came to full bloom after 1890, and was eclipsed by the Communist Revolution a scant 60 years later. This book goes beyond the missionary movement to show the tragic conflict of two basically different cultures, Western and Oriental, that never came to a full understanding of each other. The author, approaching the missionary movement as an objective outsider, devotes considerable attention to the interplay of missionary activity and the United States policy in China as well as to the crucial question of why the Communists succeeded in China where the West failed.

In the latter part of the 11th century a revolutionary group within the Western Church, centered in the papacy, attempted to overthrow the early medieval system of church-state relations by which the church in each country was under the control of kings and other secular rulers. Covering the period from the death of Archbishop Lanfranc in 1099 to the end of the reign of Henry I in 1135, this book provides a detailed history of the attempts to carry out this revolution, known as the Gregorian reform movement. It carefully weighs the issues and analyzes the causes for the failure of the movement, decisive for the future of the English Church. *Princeton Studies in History, No. 10.*
