The chemical institutes of the Kaiser Wilhelm Society, established in 1911, were designed to promote “free research” within the international scientific community but came to promote after 1914 the integration of science in the German war effort. Jeffrey Johnson examines the Kaiser Wilhelm Society within the framework of scientific and social change in order to investigate the characteristically modern tension between international scientific goals and the competing priorities of a nation headed for war.

Focusing on Marburg, a contentious university town where voters demonstrated strong electoral support for Adolf Hitler's National Socialist party, this imaginative study examines the political role of small-town organizational life and painstakingly reconstructs the full range of Nazi sympathizers' cross-affiliations within local voluntary groups. Rudy Kosbar here analyzes Nazism in a general social history of a single community without seeing German fascism as the inevitable product of local structures and traditions.
