#### **DETAILS OF MEMBERSHIP**

Membership of the Society is open to all individuals who have scientific, practical, or general interest in any aspect of snow and ice study.

Anyone wishing to join need only write to the Secretary General, International Glaciological Society, Cambridge CB2 1ER, England, requesting enrolment. No proposer or seconder is required. Subscription rates are given on the back cover of this issue.

The privileges of membership include:

- 1. Receipt of the Journal of Glaciology and of Ice, the Society's news bulletin.
- 2. Attendance at all meetings of the Society.
- 3. The use of the Society for obtaining information and for making contact with other members who have similar interests.
- 4. Reference to the Society's library of glaciological literature.

Papers on glaciology are printed in the Society's *Journal of Glaciology* which is published three times a year. *Ice* is also published three times a year. The Society organizes and sponsors symposia in various countries and publishes the proceedings in the *Annals of Glaciology*, which members may purchase at special prices.

All correspondence (except that concerning articles intended for publication in the *Journal of Glaciology*) should be addressed to the Secretary General.

### PREPARATION OF PAPERS FOR THE JOURNAL OF GLACIOLOGY

All typescripts intended for publication should be sent in triplicate to the *Journal of Glaciology*, International Glaciological Society, Lensfield Road, Cambridge CB2 1ER, England.

Papers and letters intended for publication must be typewritten on one side of the paper only, with double spacing and wide margins. The main text should be in English. An abstract not exceeding 200 words should be provided with all papers. References should be given in the style used in the *Journal*; a leaflet explaining this system is available on demand. Reference to illustrations should be made by numbering them consecutively with arabic numerals. A list of illustrations and their captions should be included with the manuscript. Tables should be numbered consecutively with roman numerals. Place-names should be in the form officially used (e.g. on maps) in the country in question. Algebraic symbols should be typed or clearly written by hand. Numerical data should be given in SI units or units approved internationally for use with SI. An article on SI units in glaciology appeared in *Journal of Glaciology*, Vol. 7, No. 50, 1968, p. 151–53. Other units, if used, should always be accompanied by SI equivalents. Algebraic symbols for physical quantities should follow the recommendations of the Commission for Symbols, Units and Nomenclature of the International Union of Pure and Applied Physics, further details of which were given in *Journal of Glaciology*, Vol. 6, No. 48, 1967, p. 779.

All illustrations (drawings and photographs) should be submitted at the following sizes: width -110 mm (1 column) or up to but not exceeding 230 mm; length - up to but not exceeding 335 mm. (These measurements relate to the size of the grid sheets used for preparing copy for plate-making at the final reduced size.) Larger sizes cannot be accepted.

Line drawings should be made on white paper with strong lines in Indian ink with lettering of sufficient size to stand the necessary reduction in plate-making. Authors are particularly requested to ensure that lettering on diagrams is consistent with the rules about units and symbols above. The original ink drawings or high quality black and white glossy prints should be sent as well as two copies. Authors wishing to have drawings or photographs returned should notify the House Editor at the time of submission of their papers.

The submission of a paper to the *Journal of Glaciology* will be taken to imply that a similar paper has not been submitted elsewhere nor is being considered for publication elsewhere. In certain cases, consideration will be given to papers published or to be published in a language other than English, but full details of the other publication and the copyright position must be given at the time of submission.

After a paper has been accepted for publication, the Secretary General will write to the author about possible financial support. Such support is voluntary and does not in any way affect publication of a paper.

The responsibility for opinions expressed in all signed articles rests with their authors. Authors *must* accept responsibility for the accuracy of all numerical data and mathematical working in their papers.
