Manuscripts, editorial and business correspondence, book reviews, advertising copy, and orders for single issues (individual \$6.00, institutional \$8.00) should be addressed to The Editor, Horizons, Journal of the CTS, Villanova University, Villanova, Pa. 19085.

In submitting manuscripts, please send the ribbon original and three clear copies. Author's name should appear only on an unpaginated cover sheet, with address and essay's title. No other identifying reference to author should appear on the manuscript. All references to author's work in text or notes should be in the third person. Essay's title should appear at top of first page of text. Notes should be placed on separate sheets at end. Full double spacing should be used throughout, including indented quotations and notes. Top, bottom, and right-hand margins should be at least one inch; left-hand margin at least one-and-a-half. HORIZONS generally follows the MLA Style Sheet. Manuscripts should be accompanied by an abstract of one hundred fifty words or less and an author vita of one hundred words or less. Manuscripts will be returned if postage is supplied.

Articles appearing in HORIZONS are abstracted and indexed in: The Catholic Periodical and Literature Index; Guide to Social Science and Religion in Periodical Literature; Index to Religious Periodical Literature; New Testament Abstracts; Religious and Theological Abstracts; and Social Science Citation Index. This issue, marking Horizons' tenth year, is dedicated to founding co-editors Bernard Prusak and Rodger Van Allen. The place Horizons now enjoys among scholarly journals, as suggested in Associate Editor Lawrence Cunningham's reflections below, rests primarily on their creative inspiration and steadfast dedication. Inevitably, these qualities had to be translated into the hard work which Associate Editor Gerard Sloyan refers to in his lead article tribute. I am sure that our regular readers and contributors join this issue's authors, the CTS Officers and Directors, and the Horizons Editors in this tribute to Professors Prusak and Van Allen.

Our founding co-editors are scholars with such wide interests that one can easily see the concerns of this issue's essays falling within the scope of each. To be a bit more specific, however, the various aspects of the biblical orientation of Gerard Sloyan's "The Samaritans in the New Testament." Bernard Cooke's "Non-Patriarchal Salvation," and Elisabeth Schüssler Fiorenza's "To Set the Record Straight: Biblical Women's Studies" remind us of Bernard Prusak's own contributions to the biblical foundations of Christology and other areas of systematic theology. In the same way, Rodger Van Allen's contributions to Christian Ethics are brought to mind by Margaret Farley's "The Church and the Family: An Ethical Task," Daniel Maguire's "The Primacy of Justice in Moral Theology," and Charles Curran's "Horizons on Fundamental Moral Theology." Matthew Lamb's "Christian Spirituality and Social Justice" illustrates the concern for the transformation of Christian life that characterizes the teaching of both founding co-editors. One notes the same concern—worked out in a rather different way—in the writing of Rosemary Haughton, whose The Passionate God is the subject of our Review Symposium.

Finally, it is with great pleasure that I welcome Lisa Sowle Cahill and Sandra Schneiders to the Editorial Board of Horizons. Fine examples of their extensive work have recently appeared in these pages.
