

**The China Quarterly** is pleased to award the 2008 Gordon White Prize to **Ethan Michelson** for his article entitled "Justice from Above or Below? Popular Strategies for Resolving Grievances in Rural China" (March 2008, No. 193).

The £500 prize is awarded annually for the most original article or research report published in **The China Quarterly** in the relevant year.

Gordon White achieved great distinction for his analysis of modern Chinese politics and society, and for his efforts to promote teaching and research on China. He served as a member of the Editorial Board and Executive Committee of **The China Quarterly** from 1991 until his death in 1998.
