The Politics of Reform in Thailand

Education in the Reign of King Chulalongkorn

Thailand, like other nations of Asia and Africa, was subjected during the last third of the nineteenth century to all the pressures and challenges of a modern, expanding, imperialistic Europe, and was one of the few to survive into the twentieth century as an independent state. To an important degree, that survival was attributable to determined efforts of modernization realized by Thailand's rulers. This study concentrates on the vigorous educational reform initiated by Chulalongkorn in the 1880s. The educational system brought into being by the time of his death in 1920 bears the hallmarks of its origins in an exciting and dangerous period—a period which is crucial to an understanding of modern Thailand.

Sources of Ming History

By WOLFGANG FRANKE, *University of Hamburg*. Until quite recently the Ming dynasty (1368-1644) was one of the most neglected periods in the study of Chinese history. Scholars under the Ch'ing dynasty were reluctant to deal with the preceding period, and as a result the Ming period was thought to be an obscure period of decline from which nothing of value could be obtained. Now that interest in the Ming period is undergoing a revival, this book will serve as a valuable introduction to help the student find his way among the numerous and complex available sources of Ming history. \$23.35

YOKOHAMA AND YEDO, 1858-1879

By JOHN R. BLACK. John Reddie Black was a newspaper editor and publisher in Japan from 1861 to 1876, and witnessed the Meiji Restoration. He personally took part in the development of the foreign settlement and noticed the concurrent changes in the political and social structure of the Japanese Empire during the restoration period. Using his files of his former publication, as well as many Japanese and British documents that came into his possession, he wrote this close-up view of the revolution which forged the foundations of modern Japan. 


