He has been largely ignored in the West and Dr Bowring's sensitive study argues for a reconsideration of his achievements.

**The China Station
War and Diplomacy 1830-1860**

Gerald S. Graham

China was opened physically to the West by the Royal Navy, and this is the first book which attempts to analyse in detail how this was done. Although essentially it was a maritime operation, the author is not merely concerned with the details of amphibious warfare leading eventually to the capture of Peking. Military strategy was bound to be influenced by British domestic policy, just as it remained inseparable from foreign policy. Hence, European rivalries, American trade competition, internal conditions in China, and missionary enterprise are woven into the narrative. £15
