IVELAW L. GRIFFITH teaches political science at Florida International University. He has published widely on Caribbean security issues, including *The Quest for Security in the Caribbean and Strategy and Security in the Caribbean*. He is currently co-editing *Democracy and Human Rights in the Caribbean* and writing a book on drugs and security funded by the MacArthur Foundation and the North-South Center at the University of Miami.

SCOTT COOK is a professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Connecticut. His most recent book, coauthored with Leigh Binford, is *Obliging Need: Rural Petty Industry in Mexican Capitalism*. He is now researching the artisanal brick industry on the Texas-Mexico border with a grant from the National Science Foundation.

JONG-TAICK JOO, a Ph.D. candidate in anthropology at the University of Connecticut, is currently writing a dissertation on forestry production and migration in Oaxaca, Mexico.

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An assistant professor of community and regional planning at the University of New Mexico, **CLAUDIA ISAAC** received her Ph.D. in urban planning at the University of California, Los Angeles. Her research focuses on the planning of economic alternatives for poor communities, particularly women in Mexico and communities of color in the southwestern United States.

ALDO LAURIA-SANTIAGO teaches Latin American and Caribbean history and Latino Studies at Eugene Lang College and for the Committee on Historical Studies of the Graduate Faculty, both part of the New School for Social Research. He completed his Ph.D. at the University of Chicago in 1992.

JOSE LUIS RENIQUE is Associate Professor of History at Herbert Lehman College of the City University of New York. The author of *Los sueños de la Sierra: Cusco en el siglo XX* (1991), he is currently completing a book on regional politics and the peasant movement in Puno, Peru.

BARBARA GEDDES teaches in the Political Science Department at the University of California, Los Angeles. Her book, *Politician's Dilemma: Building State Capacity in Latin America*, appeared recently in the UC Press series entitled *Social Choice and Political Economy*. In addition to writing about bureaucratic reform, she has analyzed the choice of new democratic institutions in Latin

America and Eastern Europe, economic liberalization, corruption, popular support for authoritarian regimes, and methodology.

BEN ROSS SCHNEIDER is Associate Professor of Political Science at Northwestern University. The author of *Politics within the State: Elite Bureaucrats and Industrial Policy in Authoritarian Brazil*, he is currently focusing on the politics of relations between business and the state in Brazil and Mexico.

RICHARD STAHLER-SHOLK is currently Visiting Assistant Professor of Political Studies at Pitzer College in Claremont, California. From 1984 to 1989, he worked as a research associate at the *Coordinadora Regional de Investigaciones Económicas y Sociales (CRIES)* in Managua, and he has written extensively on the Nicaraguan political economy.

MAGNUS MÖRNER is former Professor of Modern History at the University of Gothenburgh in Sweden. He spent five years at the University of Pittsburgh as Mellon Professor and also taught Latin American history at several other U.S. universities. He has written a dozen monographs and hundreds of items on Latin American history in various languages.
