An Introduction to the Quantitative Ethnology of Venezuela

This study analyzes census materials of different sources gathered between 1948 and 1968 among the 36 ethnic entities which constitute the aboriginal population of Venezuela. It focuses on settlement categories, household unit categories, cohesive family index, average cooperative unit index, housing, population and demography (age structure, sex ratio, fertility ratio, civil status profile), economic activities (professional profiles), and correlation of certain types of economies. These aspects are dealt with on an ethnic (tribal) as well as aggregate basis, the latter in an attempt to further differentiate between aboriginal and rural (urban) populations. This study will concern itself less with such technical matters as phonology than with the attitudes of various countries toward the language problem, with its implications for national and international politics. This long-term study represents a longitudinal analysis of socio-cultural adaptations which a regional population of peasant cultivators has made across the centuries to changing conditions of life, from the Spanish Conquest to the recent introduction of a program of unified resources development in agriculture and livestock.
