WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

12 February–18 May 1968 and 5 August–9 November 1968.

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; six on applied pharmacology; and eight on histological, pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies about 120 hours.

8 January–17 February 1968 and 1 July–10 August 1968.

INTENSIVE CLINICAL LECTURE PERIOD for Part II D.L.O. and other students.

These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

13 May–25 May 1968 and 6 November–19 November 1968.

PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

18–30 March 1968 and 30 September–12 October 1968.

ADVANCED REVISION COURSE for students taking higher surgical examinations.

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any

of the courses listed overleaf and of the short courses on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and clinical pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

Such grants may also be made to selected workers chosen by the Committee of Award to carry out certain specified work of its selection, or to a research institute selected by the Committee of Award.
