1982 ANNUAL MEETING OF ECONOMIC HISTORY ASSOCIATION

The Program Committee for the 1982 Annual Meeting to be held in Baltimore, September 23–25, 1982, consists of Alice Hanson Jones (Washington University, St. Louis), chair; Stuart Bruchey (Columbia University); and Stanley Engerman (University of Rochester). The central theme of the meeting will be "Measurements of Levels of Living," in any country, in any century. Papers on this subject are desired and it is hoped that broad coverage in time, place, and approach can be achieved. Submissions of panels and papers on other topics are also welcome. One-page abstracts should be sent to Stanley Engerman, Departments of Economics and History, University of Rochester, Rochester, New York 14627, by January 25, 1982.

Suggestions for workshops should be sent to Stanley Engerman by February 1, 1982.

The Dissertation Session will be organized by Robert E. Gallman, University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, and Diane Lindstrom, University of Wisconsin, Madison. Submissions should be sent to Diane Lindstrom, Department of History, University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin 53706, by May 16, 1982. Dissertations in economic history to be completed in the academic year 1981–1982 are eligible.

AWARDS AT 1981 E.H.A. MEETING

At the 1981 annual meeting of the Economic History Association, held in St. Louis, Missouri, September 17–19, prizes were awarded as follows:

The Arthur H. Cole Prize for the outstanding article published in the *JOURNAL* in the September 1980 through June 1981 issues, to Winifred B. Rothenberg of Brandeis University for her article, "The Market and Massachusetts Farmers, 1750–1855," in the June 1981 issue. The Cole Prize recipient is selected each year by the *JOURNAL*'s editorial board.

The Allen Nevins Prize for the outstanding dissertation in American economic history completed in 1980–1981, to Cathy McHugh of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for her dissertation, "The Family Labor System in the Southern Cotton Textile Industry, 1880–1912" (Stanford University, 1981). The Nevins Prize recipient is selected each year by the conveners of the Dissertation Session of the annual meeting.
