

Each issue of *DBR* opens with remarks from the editors concerning the three subsequent and substantive sections: STATE OF THE DISCIPLINE, where broad-gauge essays and provocative think-pieces appear; STATE OF THE ART, dedicated to observations and analyses of empirical research; and STATE OF THE DISCOURSE, featuring expansive book reviews, special feature essays, and occasionally debates. Many issues also now include a conversation between Professor Henry Louis Gates, Jr. and an eminent scholar on broad areas of research regarding race.




