### PUBLICATION NOTES

#### HISPANIC FOUNDATION PUBLICATIONS

The Hispanic Foundation of the Library of Congress has published the *Handbook of Latin American Studies, No. 31; Social Science*. The *Handbook* has over 5,500 entries covering anthropology, economics, education, geography, government, international relations, and sociology. The HF, together with the Conference on Latin American History jointly sponsored *Latin America: A Guide to its Historical Literature*, published by the University of Texas Press. This selective annotated bibliography covers the pre-Colombian period to the present and includes some 7,200 entries.

#### JAPANESE-PORTUGUESE DICTIONARY

The Instituto Iberoamericano de la Universidad Sofia, Tokyo, Japan (Viz. LARR VI, 1, Institutional News), has announced the appearance of the first edition of the *Pequeno Dicionário Português-Japonês, Japonês-Português*, compiled by Yasuhiko Sano and Nobuo Hamaguchi.

In addition, two more monographs have been published: Series A., No. 5; Claudio Veliz, "Foreign Policy and the Rise of Nationalism in Latin America"; and Series B, No. 1: Ann Pescatello: "A Preliminary Investigation of Nationalism in Twentieth Century Brazil: Definitions and the Development of the Expression." Both in Japanese, with English summaries.

#### LATIN AMERICAN LEGISLATION

The Hispanic Law Division, Law Library, Library of Congress, has compiled an *Index to Latin American Legislation, 1961-1965, First Supplement*, (Boston, G. K. Hall Co., 1970). The present work is an amplification of the two original folio volumes which appeared in 1962. They consisted of 1,474 pages with 30,900 entries, covering the ten year period 1950-1960. The new publication reproduces the original in offset on 10 by 14 inch pages of the typed card entries prepared in the Hispanic Law Division, and appends 22,000 additional entries, bringing the coverage up through 1965. The second supplement, now being indexed on cards, will bring up the currency of the publication through 1970. The digesting is in English. The brief notes are not limited to a description of the contents, but offer as well additional pertinent data as to the effect of a more recent law, decree or administrative ruling on an earlier one in the same field. The index also permits the user to locate any changes made in codified bodies of law. The index is arranged by country,

with the entries listed alphabetically by subject, and then chronologically within the subject.

Both the main work and the first supplement are available for purchase at G. K. Hall and Co., 70 Lindoln Street, Boston, Massachusetts at the advertised prices of \$170 and \$100 respectively.

#### MEXICAN STUDIES ISSUE

The University of Tulsa Monograph Series is planning publication of an issue devoted to Mexican studies in the winter of 1971–72. The theme is History and Literature, with emphasis on the relationship between the two during the Revolution of 1910. Articles between 3500 and 4500 words will be considered by the editor, I. E. Cadenhead, Jr., History Department, University of Tulsa, Tulsa, Oklahoma 74104. Depending on the success of this monograph, an annual issue on some single theme is contemplated.

#### PAPERS, IOTH & IITH MALAS MEETINGS PUBLISHED

The papers presented at the tenth and eleventh meetings of the Midwest Association for Latin American Studies have been published. The Office of International Programs of St. Louis University has put out the papers of the tenth meeting under the title of *Religious and Cultural Factors in Latin America*, edited by Charles J. It was the purpose of *MIDWAY* to make available findings of scholars in a variety of fields to readers whose interests might not lead them to the appropriate specialized journals. In an era of increasing specialization and difficulty in communication beyond the bounds of one's limited professional circles, the passing of a journal such as *MIDWAY* is of particular regret.

The Instituto Brasileiro de Bibliografia e Documentação, Conselho Nacional de Pesquisas, began the publication in January 1967 of *NOTÍCIAS*, a trimestral bulletin. It carries news items and articles of relevance to bibliographical endeavors. There are sections on congresses, meetings, and seminars, theses completed, and publications.
