Responses to issues raised in the fora are welcomed by the Editor and will be subject to the usual review procedure. Substantial review articles will be commissioned to discuss important new books. The Book Review Editor also welcomes proposals for such reviews. Unsolicited review articles will be accepted on the basis of peer review.
