THE LEAD ARTICLE IN THE FIRST *Review of Politics* issue, January 1939, was by Jacques Maritain, adviser and helper of *The Review* all through its early stages. We note the anniversary of his birth (November 11, 1882) with two articles by Notre Dame professors. One is by LEO R. WARD, of the Congregation of Holy Cross, a founding father of *The Review*, a friend, admirer and translator of Jacques Maritain, and Emeritus Professor of Philosophy. SPEGELE is Senior Lecturer in the Department of International Relations, University of the Witwatersrand, South Africa.

REVEREND ERNEST L. FORTIN, A.A., is Professor of Theology in Boston College. VICTOR FERKISS is Professor of Government in Georgetown University. REVEREND FRANCIS CANAVAN, S.J., is a member of the Political Science Department in Fordham University. PHILIP F. RILEY is Associate Professor of History in James Madison University. GEORGE BRINKLEY is Professor of Government at Notre Dame. ROBIN W. LOVIN is Associate Professor of Ethics and Society in the Divinity School of the University of Chicago. CARLETON W.
