FORTHCOMING EVENTS

Oxford Institute of Psychiatry

The Oxford Institute of Psychiatry is again arranging postgraduate courses in psychological medicine during the autumn of 1975 and the spring of 1976. The syllabus has been arranged in accordance with the requirements for the Diploma in Psychological Medicine and the Membership Examination of the Royal College of Psychiatrists, and the courses seek to assist doctors preparing for either, and also to provide a comprehensive academic grounding in psychological medicine. Each consists of one week's concentrated academic instruction by lectures and demonstrations in an informal atmosphere. The tuition fee for each course is £30; accommodation in College can be arranged for an additional £30.

Commencement dates of courses in the autumn term are:

Course A. Psychology with Behavioural Sciences (Jesus College), 8 September 1975.

Course B. Neuroanatomy, Neurophysiology, Neurology (Mansfield College), 22 September 1975.

Course C. Psychiatry (College of St. Edmund Hall), 29 September 1975.

Course A. Psychology with Behavioural Science (College of St. Edmund Hall), 14 April 1976.

Course B. Neuroanatomy, Neurophysiology, Neurology (College of St. Edmund Hall), 17 March 1976.

Course C. Psychiatry (Mansfield College), 21 April 1976.

The Applications of Electronics in Medicine

The above is the title of the Golden Jubilee conference and exhibition of the Institution of Electronic and Radio Engineers, to be held in the University of Southampton Medical School on 6–7 April 1976. The Royal Society of Medicine is one of the co-operating organizing bodies. The object is to provide a forum for the discussion and exhibition of applied electronics in medicine, and ample time will be available for discussion. Offers of papers for the Conference are invited. These should cover recent or newly proposed applications of electronics to medical problems affecting the different systems of the body. These applications may include (a) research, (b) teaching, (c) diagnosis or pattern recognition, (d) intensive care, (e) rehabilitation or prosthesis, (f) information retrieval, (g) epidemiology, and (h) functional stimulation.
