## THE CONTRIBUTORS

CIRO ELLIOTT ZOPPO is on the research staff of the Social Science Department of The RAND Corporation. The author of "France as a Nuclear Power" in R. N. Rosecrance's *The Dispersion of Nuclear Weapons* (1964), he is completing a book on the technology and politics of the nuclear test ban. His contribution to this issue was written while he was a Research Associate at the Harvard Center for International Affairs.

ROBERT E. DOWSE is a Lecturer in Politics in Exeter University, England, and a frequent contributor to academic journals. His book *Left in the Centre: A History of the Independent Labour Party* was published this year, and he is working on a study of comparative development in the USSR and Ghana.

HAYWARD R. ALKER, JR., is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Political Science at Yale, author of *Mathematics and Politics* (1965), and coauthor of *World Politics in the General Assembly* (1965), and *The World Handbook of Political and Social Indicators* (1964). He is now engaged in a simulation study of international conflict.

RAVI L. KAPIL, Assistant Professor in the Department of Political Science, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, is serving as the Director of the Peace Corps in Somalia.

KENNETH W. GRUNDY will in September assume duties as Associate Professor of Political Science at Western Reserve University. He is currently at work on a chapter on Kwame Nkrumah for a forthcoming book on political thought in tropical Africa.

DANKWART A. RUSTOW is Professor of International Social Forces at Columbia University and a member of its Institute of War and Peace Studies. He is the author of *The Politics of Compromise* (1955), coauthor of *The Politics of the Developing Areas* (1960), and coeditor of *Political Modernization in Japan and Turkey* (1964). He is writing a book on political problems of modernization.

JOHN M. MONTIAS, Professor of Economics, Yale University, is the author of *Central Planning in Poland* (1962) and is at work on a study of the Rumanian economy.

KLAUS EPSTEIN is Chairman of the History Department at Brown University and author of *The Genesis of German Conservatism*, to be published this year.

GERALD GARVEY is a Lecturer in Government at Georgetown University. He edited, with Alpheus T. Mason, Edward S. Corwin's *American Constitutional History* (1964) and is now finishing a book on political parties.

JOSEF KORBEL is Dean of the Graduate School of International Studies and Professor of International Relations at the University of Denver. He has written *Tito's Communism* (1951), *Danger in Kashmir* (1954, revised 1966), *Communist Subversion of Czechoslovakia* (1959), and *Poland Between East and West* (1963).

EZRA F. VOGEL is a Lecturer in the Department of Social Relations and a Research Associate of the East Asian Research Center at Harvard, where he is preparing a book on Canton City under communism.
