Promotions, etc.: We offer congratulations to Mr. D.K. Adams, research student of Nuffield College, Oxford, on his assistant lectureship at the University College of North Staffs.; to Mr. Max Beloff, on his appointment to the Gladstone Professorship of Government and Public Administration in the University of Oxford; to Dr. Kenneth Bourne, now an assistant lecturer in international history at L.S.E.; to Mr. A.P. Thornton, formerly lecturer in history at Aberdeen, on his appointment to a chair of history in the West Indies; and to Mr. Esmond Wright, formerly senior lecturer in American history at Glasgow, on being elevated to the chair of modern history in that university.

Travels: Our Chairman, Mr. Thistlethwaite, was visiting professor of American Civilization at the University of Pennsylvania during the autumn months of 1956. Two other committee-members, Professor Hawgood and Mr. Gorley Putt, have recently returned from the U.S.; and Professor Hawgood is going back again, as visiting professor at the summer American Studies conference of the University of Wyoming. Professor H.C. Allen has been awarded a Commonwealth Fund American Studies fellowship for work in modern American history. He will, from August to December 1957, be based upon the University of Virginia, in Charlottesville. Mr. Marcus Cunliffe will be at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, Stanford, California, from September 1957 to June 1958. In June-July 1958 he will follow in the wake of Prof. Hawgood as visiting professor at Wyoming. Mr. Richard Hoggart of Hull (whose The Uses of Literacy has met with a deservedly warm reception) has been at the University of Rochester during 1956-57. Mr. J.M. Cameron, of Leeds, will be visiting professor at the University of Notre Dame, South Bend, Indiana, during 1957-58. Mr. A.D. Hook, research student at Manchester, has been awarded a Procter Fellowship at Princeton for 1957-58, to work in modern American literature.

Publications: Our members publish so many books and articles (though not always in the field of American Studies) that it is hard to keep up with them. A more systematic attempt can be made in future when (see p.8) we have developed the cooperative machinery necessary to supply the ASA with annual bibliographical information. Apart from the Allen-Hill symposium referred to above, we might however mention articles by Mr. Beloff ("Self-Determination Reconsidered") in Confluence (Autumn 1956); by Mr. Malcolm Bradbury ("Sex, Success and Sympathy" - comments on American freshmen at a Mid-Western university) in The Twentieth Century (Feb. 1957); and by Mr. W.J. Harvey (on Scott Fitzgerald) in Essays and Studies (January 1957).
