

Soviet Society Today

Michael Rywkin

In this engaging and very accessible introduction to contemporary Soviet society, Michael Rywkin takes the reader on a far-ranging guided tour of Soviet life—in the city and in the countryside, in the capitals and in the remote regions, among young and old, the elite and the disadvantaged. We trace the melding of traditional cultures with official ideology and examine the core institutions of the "system"—federalism, state management of the economy, one-party rule, bureaucracy, and secret police. We examine the social structure, including not only the "official" classes of workers and peasants but also the elite, the new middle class, and those on the bottom rungs of the social ladder. We find out what money can buy in terms of goods, services, and the necessities of life, whether in a Baltic city or a remote Central Asian village, and what privileges and advantages are not for sale but are afforded on the basis of social position. Chapters on education, health care, the workplace, the role of women, and youth culture, among other topics, show how Soviet citizens' lives resemble our own and how they differ. And most important, we look at the many sources of dynamism and change in the society—demographic shifts and social mobility, economic and social trends, cultural and intellectual ferment, and national and religious revivals.

There is no more concise, informed, readable, and up-to-date book available on Soviet society today. It is the single best choice for introductory courses on the Soviet Union, for travelers, and for the general reader interested in taking a closer look at the unfolding social experiment that is the Soviet Union.

Michael Rywkin is professor of Russian Area Studies at the City College of New York. His work is based on years of study of the Soviet Union through research, teaching, travel, and personal experience.

SUBMISSION OF MANUSCRIPTS

All contributions must be submitted in three copies and double-spaced throughout. Footnotes should be placed at the end of the manuscript. The modified Library of Congress system of Cyrillic transliteration should be used.

In general, articles should not exceed 30 double-spaced pages, except where especially justified by extensive tables and charts. The University of Chicago Press *Manual of Style* should be consulted for purposes of style and footnoting. Authors should send a brief academic c.v. along with their articles. Manuscripts will not be returned unless specifically requested and postage provided. The editors reserve the right to edit all submissions.

The editors accept for publication scholarly articles, review articles and documents in the areas of social sciences and humanities in English, French and German.
