



From the Madrid Invitation in 1991 to the introduction of the Oslo process in 1993 to the present, a negotiated settlement has remained the dominant leitmotiv of peacemaking between Israel and the Palestinian people. That the parties have chosen negotiations means that either side's failure to comply with its obligation to negotiate can result in an internationally wrongful act and, in response, countermeasures and other responses. This monograph seeks to advance our understanding of the international law of negotiation and use this as a framework for assessing the Israeli-Palestinian dispute, with the Palestinian people's unsuccessful attempt to join the United Nations as a Member State in autumn 2011 and the successful attempt to join the same institution as a non-Member Observer State in November 2012 providing a case study for this. The legal consequences of these applications are not merely of historical interest; they inform the present rights and obligations of Israel and the Palestinian people. This work fills a significant gap in the existing international law scholarship on the Israeli-Palestinian dispute, which neither engages with this means of dispute settlement generally nor does so specifically within the context of the Palestinian people's engagements with international institutions.

Trade in the Service of Sustainable Development

Linking Trade to Labour Rights
and Environmental Standards
Olivier De Schutter

In the Bretton Woods era, trade liberalization, the improvement of labour rights and working conditions, and the strengthening of environmental policies, were seen as mutually supportive. But is this always true? Can we continue to pretend to protect the rights of workers and to improve environmental protection, particularly through climate change mitigation strategies, within an agenda focused on trade liberalization? Is it credible to pursue trade policies that aim to expand the volumes of trade, without linking such policies to labour and environmental standards, seen as 'non-trade' concerns? This book asks these questions, offering a detailed analysis of whether linkage is desirable and legally acceptable under the disciplines of the World Trade Organization (WTO). It concludes that trade can work for sustainable development, but only if we see it as a means for social and environmental progress, including climate change mitigation, and if we avoid fetishizing it as an end to be pursued for its own sake.

Olivier De Schutter was the UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food (2008-14) and is now a Member of the UN Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights.



The ASIL Holtzmann Center is established in honor of Judge Howard M. Holtzmann. Over the course of his career, Judge Holtzmann has made enormous contributions to the field of international arbitration and conciliation, and mentored scores of young lawyers working in the field. He was central to the American Arbitration Association (AAA) work with the Arbitration Institute of the Stockholm Chamber of Commerce to build an East-West bridge through international arbitration. Notable achievements include: service as a member of the U.S. delegation to the Arbitration Working Group of the UN Commission on International Trade Law (1974-2011), which produced the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules, the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules, and the UNCITRAL Model Law on International Commercial Arbitration, and service as a Member of the Iran-U.S. Claims Tribunal (1981-1994). For his pioneering work, the King of Sweden inducted Judge Holtzmann as a Commander of the Royal Order of the Polar Star in 2003. In 2005, he received the Silver Medal of Honor of Vienna, and in 2006, the AAA gave him its highest honor, the Peacemaker Award, for his "work to further peace throughout the world." Judge Holtzmann has been a member of ASIL since 1972.
