Finding that this text was probably fabricated by the controversial Confucian master, Wang Su (A.D. 195–256), Ariel explains how it sheds light on the third-century philosophical milieu: Confucianism then is seen to have been not only Taoistically metaphysical, individualistic, and escapist, but also aggressive in advocating early Confucian values.

Mark R. Woodward

By uniting the traditional view of religion as an explanatory system with contemporary cognitive anthropology, Mark Woodward provides a theoretical as well as historical and ethnographic solution to the question of why Islam became the dominant religion of Java. His study demonstrates that Islam is the predominant force in the religious beliefs and rites of the central Javanese, one which shapes the character of social interaction and daily life in all segments of Javanese society.

Through firsthand observation of ritual practice and a detailed comparison of sacred texts, Woodward came to understand how individuals make sense of the totality of Javanese religion. His study is supported by both Javanese materials—sacred texts and ethnographic data—and such non-Javanese sources as the Qura'n Hadith; Sufi mystical treatises; works by western and South Asian Islamicists on ritual, history, and law; and ethnographic studies of Islam in Arabia, North Africa, Persia and India. It considers such theoretical issues as relationships between religious texts, popular religion, social organization, and social and religious discourse.
