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THE AMBROSIAN ALLELUIAS

Terence Bailey

An edition from three manuscript sources in parallel of the Alleluias of the Ambrosian Rite, preceded by a history of the Alleluia in the West, a reconstruction of the ceremonial for singing the Alleluia in Milan, and an analysis of the melodies.

The Alleluias of the Ambrosian Rite are among the most striking melodies of the entire plainchant repertory. In some cases exceeding 600 notes in length (even excluding literal repetitions), they have never before been edited in their complete form.

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The performance of the Alleluias often entailed multiple repetitions involving deacon, magister puerorum, lectors and choirboys, and the singing of extended melismas known as melodiae secondae and melodiae tertiae (or Francigenae). An introduction, of some hundred pages' length, describes the development of ceremonial and the liturgical assignment of the Alleluias. The evolution of a system of internal repetitions within the melismas, never before recognized and analysed, suggests structural parallels with the early medieval sequence. Professor Bailey's study of the liturgical and musical development of the Ambrosian Alleluia leads him to a reconsideration of the early history of the Alleluia in the West.
