The Harlaxton Prize

The University of Evansville, in cooperation with *Albion*, is pleased to announce the establishment of the HARLAXTON PRIZE to be awarded annually to the author(s) of the best essay in British studies to appear in that year's volume of *Albion*. The award will be \$200, and the recipient will give a public lecture at the University of Evansville, or, if resident in Great Britain, at the University's campus at Harlaxton Manor, Northumberland (expenses paid). This award will first be made on 15 March 1975, and apply to volume six (1974-75) of *Albion*. The prize board members are: President Wallace Graves (Evansville); Joseph O. Baylen (Georgia State); Charles F. Mullett (Emeritus, Missouri); Philip P. Poirier (Ohio State); and John W. Wilkes (New York University). The deadline for submitting manuscripts for the first award will be 15 December 1974. Manuscripts are to be sent in triplicate to: Dr. Michael J. Moore, Managing Editor of *Albion*, Appalachian State University, Boone. N. C. 28608.

Editors Note

ALBION is very pleased that through the generosity of the University of Evansville it can offer the Harlaxton Prize to British Studies scholars. This prize will be offered annually for the next three years with awards being made for volumes six (1974-75), seven (1975-76), and eight (1976-77). Those who wish to have their essays considered must abide the deadlines and manuscript texts should not exceed 9,000 words, or about 26-30 pages of typescript.

ALBION will consider for publication manuscripts concerned with all areas of British studies as the contents of this and preceding issues will attest. It is especially interested in thematic issues and welcomes any assistance you might be able to give in suggesting themes and authors.

A final word is in order. If you agree that ALBION is becoming a solid and respectable scholarly journal, please do two things; 1) check to see if your institution's library subscribes, and if not, ask that it do so; 2) suggest ways in which ALBION can serve the needs of scholars and teachers in British studies and indicate whether you might be able to assist in developing new services.
