

## Editor's Notes

*The Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies* at the University of California, Los Angeles, in conjunction with a number of neighboring institutions, will sponsor an international conference of American and European scholars to consider the multiple ways in which the discovery of the New World affected the thought, modes of life, and institutions of the Old. "First Images of America: The Impact of the New World on the Old" is being held in honor of the Renaissance Society of America, which will for the first time convene in the Western United States. The projected program, to be held February 6-9, 1975, includes twenty-two panels, broadly divided into three areas: the impact on the European imagination (art and literature); the impact on political institutions, legal concepts, and historiography; and the impact on economics, agriculture, science, and technology. *The Third World Congress of the Econometric Society* will be held in Toronto, Canada, from August 20 to August 26, 1975. The Program Committee welcomes the submission of papers in econometric history. Anyone may submit a paper or a proposal for a paper to any member of the Program Committee: Professor Gavin Wright (Department of Economics, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan 48104) is a member of the Program Committee. Submissions should include the name and address of the author, a full title, and an approximately 150-word abstract of the paper. Final decisions on papers will be made by the full Program Committee in early 1975, but submissions should be made well before then. No paper will be accepted unless the author agrees to provide a completed paper to the chairman of the Local Arrangements Committee by May 31, 1975, for reproduction and distribution at the Congress.

An additional attraction for economic historians at the Congress will be a Symposium on Cliometrics which will include two invited surveys of recent developments in the field. Details on this and other arrangements for the Congress will be available at a later date.
