Brook Thomas explores the new historicism and the challenges posed to it by a postmodern world that questions the very possibility of legitimate newness. Attempting to replace both the new critical formalism and the old historicism, the new historicism distinguishes itself by its engagement with post structuralism. According to Thomas, a major task facing the new historicism is how to construct new histories without relying on a sense of temporality. It is on this point, he argues, that literature has an important role to play, but only if new historicists recognize the limits of a mimetic model for historical analysis.
