Assistant Professor in Anthropological Archaeology

The Department of Anthropology of the University at Albany/State University of New York seeks to hire a tenure-track Assistant Professor of the archaeology of the Northeastern United States, Central Canada (Quebec and Ontario) and/or adjacent regions. Preferred candidates will have methodological expertise in environmental archaeology, for example, paleoethnobotany, isotopic analysis, ancient health, paleoclimatology, human ecology, or similar methods and approaches. Strong candidates will be expected to teach methodological courses in one or more of these topics as well as offer opportunities for undergraduate and graduate students to become directly involved in research.

Applicants must have a record of, or show strong promise for, generating external funding. Publications in peer-reviewed journals as well as evidence of an active research program and excellent teaching are required. Candidates must hold a Doctoral degree in anthropology or archaeology, with an emphasis on archaeological field work, from a university accredited by the U.S. Department of Education or an internationally recognized accrediting organization. PhD in hand by August of 2016 is required.

Applicants must address in their applications their ability to work with and instruct a culturally diverse population. A review of applications will begin on December 1, 2015 and the search will remain open until the position is filled. Interviews will begin in January 2016. The position start date is Sept. 1, 2016. Papers on Latin American archaeology addressing broad methodological, theoretical, or comparative issues may be accepted by either journal after consultation with the editors. Authors submit manuscripts to the editor for consideration as ARTICLES, REPORTS, COMMENTS, or FORUM essays. REVIEWS and BOOK NOTES are solicited by the respective associate editor. OBITUARIES should be submitted to the editor, *The SAA Archaeological Record*, for publication (see *SAA Bulletin* March/April 1996, p. 7, for further details).

Authors are required to submit manuscripts electronically through Editorial Manager® (<http://www.editorialmanager/aq>). Detailed information on policy, style, and technical matters of manuscript preparation is given in the "Editorial Policy, Information for Authors, and Style Guide for *American Antiquity* and *Latin American Antiquity*," which appeared in the October 1992 issue (57:749–770) and can be read on the World Wide Web at <http://www.saa.org/Publications/StyleGuide/styframe.html>.

The editor reserves the right to evaluate manuscripts (with or without peer review) for appropriate subject matter, quality, length, and compliance with the style guide. Manuscripts may be returned to authors if they fail to meet expectations or conform to these guidelines. Manuscripts are evaluated by the editor in consultation with peer referees, as appropriate. The editor has the final responsibility for all decisions regarding manuscripts. The review process generally takes a minimum of two to four months. Authors will be notified as soon as a decision is reached to accept (outright or with revisions) or reject a manuscript.
