



Research Planning Group Grants

A grant has been awarded for group research on Comparative Social Organization of Innovation and Production. Among the convenors are **Richard Gordon**, board of politics, University of California at Santa Cruz, and **Joel Krieger**, department of political science.

Fund for Research on Dispute Resolution

The Fund for Research on Dispute Resolution has awarded ten new grants totaling \$485,000. Recipients include the following:

Margaret Neale, Robin Pinkley, Jack Brittan, and Gregory Northcraft, J. L. Kellogg Graduate School of Management, Northwestern University, received a \$73,405 grant to study how managers resolve disputes within organizations.


James Perry, School of Public and Environmental Affairs, Indiana University, received a \$42,988 grant to study what happens when employees "blow the whistle" on their employers' illegal or illegitimate practices by initiating a complaint.

Grawemeyer Award

Robert Keohane, chair of the department of government at Harvard University, won the Grawemeyer Award for Ideas Improving World Order for his 1984 book, "After Hegemony: Cooperation and Discord in the World Political Economy." Judges praised Keohane's seminal ideas for international cooperation in the absence of one or two dominant economic powers. Each winner will receive a cash prize of \$150,000. The Grawemeyer Awards recognize outstanding concepts in music, education, political affairs and religion.

Guggenheim Memorial Foundation

Other Awards and Honors







In Memoriam

Kenneth C. Cole

Kenneth C. Cole died April 1, 1988, at the age of 90. He received a Bachelor's Degree from Oxford University in 1924,
