# Journal of Policy History

The *Journal of Policy History* provides an interdisciplinary forum for scholars concerned with the application of historical perspectives to public policy studies. The journal aims to encourage research into the formation and development of public policy while encouraging the application of diverse methods and theories to public policy and their politics within a historical perspective. In addition to social scientists and historians, the journal seeks to inform policymakers through a historical approach to public policy.

The *Journal of Public History* is intended to give voice to scholars interested in understanding public policies and their development through historical inquiry and interpretation. Although the primary focus of the journal remains the origins and development of public policy in the United States, comparative historical approaches to the development of public policies in other nations are also welcomed.

Manuscripts should be typed double-spaced with end notes following the text and generally should not exceed 30 typewritten pages. Manuscripts accepted for publication will be reviewed anonymously, and authors' names, including positions, addresses, and phone numbers, should appear only on the title page. Any notes referring to the authors should be placed on a separate page to further maintain anonymity during the reviewing process. Four copies of a manuscript, together with an abstract of no more than 150 words and a biographical sketch of no more than 50 words, should be sent to the Editors, *Journal of Policy History*, P.O. Box 533, University of Notre Dame, Notre Dame, IN 46556.
