THE CONTRIBUTORS

CHARLES R. NIXON is Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Los Angeles. He is currently working on a study of problems of political and economic change in Nigeria during the period from 1950 to the outbreak of the Nigeria-Biafra conflict.

RICHARD C. THORNTON is Associate Professor of History and a member of the Institute of Sino-Soviet Studies at The George Washington University. He is the author of *The Comintern and the Chinese Communists* (1969), *Bear and Dragon, Sino-Soviet Relations and the Political Evolution of the Chinese People's Republic, 1949-1971* (1972), and is currently completing a major study, *China, the Struggle for Power, 1917-1971*.

JAMES L. PAYNE is Associate Professor of Political Science at the School of Advanced International Studies of The Johns Hopkins University. He is the author of *Patterns of Conflict in Colombia* (1968) and is currently working on studies which extend the application of incentive types to the Dominican Republic and to American politicians.

OLIVER H. WOSHINSKY, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Maine at Portland-Gorham, is currently working on a study of incentives and behavior among French Deputies.

HENRY A. TURNER, JR. is Professor of History at Yale University. He is the author of *Stresemann and the Politics of the Weimar Republic* (1963) and *Faschismus und Kapitalismus in Deutschland: Studien zum Verhältnis zwischen Nationalsozialismus und Wirtschaft* (forthcoming 1972). At present he is preparing a study entitled *German Big Business and the Rise of Hitler* for publication in this country.

DENNIS PARANZINO is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, University of Pennsylvania. He is currently engaged, with Professor Vincent McHale, in a study of the political consequences of developmental change, focusing on the French experience.

JAMES L. RICHARDSON is Senior Lecturer in Government at the University of Sydney, Australia. He is the author of *Germany and the Atlantic Alliance* (1966) and is at present working on the historical analysis of international crises.

CHRISTIAN P. POTHOLM is Associate Professor of Government and Legal Studies at Bowdoin College. He is the author of *Four African Political Systems* (1970) and the forthcoming *Swaziland: The Dynamics of Political Modernization*. He is also the co-editor of *Southern Africa in Perspective: Essays in Regional Politics* (1972).
