

Religion and psychiatry: clinical applications

In the second article, the authors focus on clinical applications that may be useful to psychiatrists and other mental health professionals. They discuss general clinical applications relevant to all patients (e.g. taking a spiritual history, supporting/encouraging religious beliefs, referring to clergy), violations of clinician-patient boundaries and the need to ensure that religious/spiritual interventions are patient-centred. They describe evidence-based religious interventions and how to identify appropriate patients for this approach. Finally, they explore situations in which religious beliefs and practices may be a problem, not a resource, and make recommendations on how to address such cases.
