

dent of the Association for Scientific Study of Religion: Southwest.


Ibrahim Karawan, associate professor of political science, University of Utah, is returning to teach full time after a two year leave to work at the International Institute for Strategic Studies.



Awards

1997 Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellowships

The John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation has awarded fellowships to 164 arists, scholars, and scientists for 1997. The fellows were selected "on the basis of unusually distinguished achievement in the past and exceptional promise for future accomplishments." Among the winners were three political scientists:

James E. Alt, professor of government, Harvard University and 1997 APSA Annual Meeting Program Co-Chair, for work on political parties, institutions, and fiscal policy.

James Miller, professor of political science and director, liberal studies program in the graduate faculty of political and social science, New School for Social Research, for work on a cultural history of rock n' roll.

Anthony Marx, associate professor of political science, Columbia University, for work on the nation-state and its exclusion. Marx has also been awarded fellowships from the Howard Foundation and the National Humanities Center. His book, Making Race and Nation: A Comparison of South Africa, the United States and Brazil, is forthcoming from Cambridge University Press.

1997 Johan Skytte Prize

Arend Lijphart, Research Professor of Political Science, University of California-San Diego, and former APSA president, has been selected to receive the 1997 Johan Skytte Prize in Political Science. Presented annually by the Johan Skytte Foundation of Uppsala University, Sweden, Lijphart was recognized for his "theoretical and empirically pathbreaking research on the function of consensus in democratic politics in divided as well as homogenous soci-
