### International Brain Research Association

The first of a new series of newsletters designed to re-establish communication between the rapidly growing international community of scientific workers of varied disciplines concerned with the brain was launched at the beginning of this year. It is to replace and to extend in a new format the *IBRO Bulletin* published for many years by UNESCO as a part of their collaborative programme with the International Brain Research Organization and distributed free of charge to members of affiliated organizations.

*IBRO News* is distributed quarterly as an addendum to *Brain Research* and separately as offprints to all members of IBRO. Mailing to IBRO members is made possible by a grant from the division of Science Promotion and Development of UNESCO as a part of continuing IBRO-UNESCO collaboration in the field of neurobiology and multidisciplinary brain research.

The newsletter is to consist of three parts as follows:

(1) *Forum* (Editor: Dr. Derek Richter)—policy statements concerning the development of the brain sciences and their impact upon international problems of human health and welfare, and a forum for the exchange of ideas between IBRO members on subjects of importance to the promotion and development of the brain sciences.

(2) *Reports* (Section-Editor: Dr. Dietrich Lehmann)—brief reports from affiliated national and international scientific organizations concerned with neurobiology, the neurosciences, or brain research which may be of international interest. Reports of meetings and symposia.

(3) *Announcements* (Section-Editor: Dr. Dietrich Lehmann)—announcements of forthcoming meetings, IBRO affairs, and collaborative programmes with UNESCO and WHO; fellowships, awards, training programmes, granting institutions, job opportunities, new journals, etc.

All national, regional or international societies and organizations concerned with brain research in the neurosciences wishing to make use of the *IBRO Newsletter* are hereby invited to establish regular communication with the Editors of the *IBRO Newsletter*.

### A New Journal

*Biological Psychology* intends to publish original scientific papers dealing with the biological correlates of psychological states. The biological measures include variables from physiology, biochemistry, endocrinology and pharmacology, which would be related to changes in behavioural states induced by artificial means, or occurring spontaneously; the latter would include diseased states. The Journal concentrates on work on human subjects but it will accept animal work of particular relevance to human psychology. Review articles and short papers of less than 900 words are welcome.

### Institute of Group Analysis

A further course in group work will take place on Thursday afternoons at the Institute beginning on 4 October 1973. Formerly called the 'Introductory
