#### PREHISTORY OF THE EASTERN SAHARA

By FRED WENDORF and ROMUALD SCHILD A Volume in the STUDIES IN ARCHAEOLOGY Series FROM THE PREFACE: This book describes the major results of a long-term multi-disciplinary study of the Pleistocene and Early Holocene environments of the Western Desert of Egypt and the human exploitation of these environments. The area studied is today one of the driest and least hospitable on earth, with virtually no rainfall, extremely high temperatures during much of the year, and seemingly devoid of all life except near widely scattered wells or oases.

Following a brief description of the research meth-

ods and the modern environment, the main body of the book is concerned with the presentation of data from five widely separated localities. For each locality the lithostratigraphic sequence is given first, followed by a detailed consideration of the associated archaeology. These data are then used to reconstruct both the environmental sequence of the Western Desert and the pattern of human exploitation of the area, and to compare these with data available from elsewhere in North Africa. 1980, 432 pp., \$65.00 ISBN: 0-12-743960-0


