Joseph de Prémare came to China from France in 1698 and worked as a missionary in Jiangxi until 1724, when he was banished to Canton by the Chinese government. While in exile at Canton, he composed the *Notitia Linguae Sinicae*, a masterly treatise on the structure of the Chinese language which formed the basis of academic sinology in Europe for more than a century, and was reprinted as late as 1893. In this study, Knud Lundbaek provides a comprehensive picture of Prémare's philological and theological ideas, prominent among which was the concept of 'figurism'. The book also describes the intellectual milieu in which de Prémare moved, including other famous figurist Jesuit scholars such as Joachim Bouvet and Jean-Francois Foucquet. This biography is an important contribution to the history of European sinology as well as to the study of China's relations with the West.

PURPOSE AND ORGANIZATION

The Association for Asian Studies is a scholarly, non-political, and non-profit professional association open to all persons interested in Asia and the study of Asia. It seeks through publications, meetings, and seminars to facilitate contact and exchange of information among scholars and to increase understanding of Asia. The Association for Asian Studies is the largest society of its kind in the world. Its 7,000 members include scholars, teachers, business people, diplomats, journalists, and interested laypersons.

Founded in 1941 as the Far Eastern Association, the organization was renamed the Association for Asian Studies in 1957 to reflect the wider geographic interests of its membership. In 1970, four elective area Councils—South Asia, Southeast Asia, China and Inner Asia, and Northeast Asia—were established to guarantee each area constituency its own representation and a proportionate voice on the Board of Directors. In 1977, a Council of Conferences was established as a liaison with eight regional conferences throughout the United States to serve the needs of those interested in Asian studies in different parts of the country. The Association is a member of the American Council of Learned Societies and the National Council of Area Studies Associations, actively participating with its sister societies in a wide range of activities, including joint participation in research and informational exchanges.
