INSTRUCTIONS TO CONTRIBUTORS

Contributions are welcome whether or not the author is a member of of the Association. Manuscripts on any aspect of African affairs, including the relations of Africa and Africans with the rest of the world, are published in the Review. The Review publishes four types of manuscripts: (1) articles, which in most circumstances should not exceed 30 pages of copy, or about 7500 words, and which present new information, findings and interpretations of general interdisciplinary interest to African studies; (2) research notes, which present methodological issues of importance to current research on Africa; (3) teaching notes, which discuss new approaches to teaching about Africa at all levels of education; and (4) review essays which discuss and evaluate a set of new publications on a topic of general interest to African studies. Research notes, teaching notes, and review essays should not exceed 15 pages of copy, or about 3,700 words.

All manuscripts should be submitted in duplicate. They should be double-spaced and may be typed, mimeographed, hectographed, or in other legible form. Footnotes should appear at the end of the manuscript, not at the bottom of the page. Manuscripts will be submitted without name of author to outside readers. Please include a removable cover page giving title, authorship, affiliation, and address. The article itself should carry only the title. A Review Style Sheet may be secured from the Editors, or consult any issue of the Review beginning with the September, 1974, issue (Volume 17, Number 2).

All editorial correspondence and manuscripts, with the exception of teaching notes and review essays, should be sent to The Editors, African Studies Review, Program of Eastern African Studies, Syracuse University, 119 College Place, Syracuse, New York, 13210, U.S.A.
