The International African Institute, in conjunction with Manchester University Press, announces a new series of scholarly books in African studies, the International African Library, under the general editorship of J. D. Y. Peel (University of Liverpool) and David Parkin (School of Oriental and African Studies, London).

Theoretically informed ethnography, studies of social relations 'on the ground', with due attention to local cultural forms, has long been the chief focus of the IAI's publications. The new series will maintain this strength, but extend it into areas of contemporary concern, both practical and theoretical. So it is also intended to include works focused on problems of development, especially on the linkages between local and national levels of society; studies along the interface between the social and environmental sciences; and historical studies, particularly those concerned with social, cultural and interdisciplinary questions.
