

religious matters is delightful. The treatment of such a topic as "Church Establishment and Religious Equality" leaves little to be desired, considering the scale on which the writer has worked. The statements as to the breach with Rome under Henry VIII might have been more precise and yet simple enough for young people. A few more names and dates would have improved the work. To mention Clarkson but not Wilberforce in connection with the suppression of the slave trade and to give no date except "early in the nineteenth century" are pedagogical mistakes. Clear, precise statements are necessary. There are several little slips of no great importance. But all in all the book, slight as it is, is excellent.
