Scope and contributions

International Psychogeriatrics is written by and for those doing clinical, teaching, and research work with older people. It is the official journal of the International Psychogeriatric Association (IPA) and is published by Cambridge University Press, Cambridge, UK. Although it is primarily concerned with psychogeriatrics, the journal welcomes contributions from all concerned with the field of mental health and aging. Original research papers are particularly sought.

Contributions include original research articles, case reports, reviews of the literature, book reviews, letters to the editor, and editorials. Apart from editorials and book reviews, which are commissioned, contributions to International Psychogeriatrics are spontaneously written and submitted by authors. Papers are reviewed by two expert reviewers selected by the Editor-in-Chief. At present, about half of the papers submitted are accepted for publication. The journal's Science Citation Index impact factor is 2.18 (2012). Submission of a paper implies that it is neither under consideration for publication elsewhere, nor previously published in English. Manuscripts must be formatted double-spaced with ample margins on all sides and the pages should be numbered. International Psychogeriatrics uses the spelling of American English. Manuscripts written by those whose primary language is not English should be edited carefully for language prior to submission. The journal has a Language Assistance Panel consisting of both native English speakers willing to check mauscripts for style prior to submission, and bilingual experts willing to assist with the translation of manuscripts into English.
