


NONGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS AND THE IDEAS OF HUMAN RIGHTS

NGOs based in the United States have been important actors in the creation of the international human rights regime and in the promotion of human rights as an aim of United States foreign policy. The author examines the programs of representative organizations, and finds that they emphasize different rights, defend different victims, challenge different violators, and advocate different foreign policies. While their programs are sometimes complementary, NGOs often support opposing positions on critical issues such as policy toward the Soviet Union and intervention in the Third World.


