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### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting will be held at the Royal Geographical Society at 1630 on Tuesday 28 October 1980. The Presidential Address will be given by Captain R. Maybourn. entitled 'Arctic Navigation – Past, Present and Future'.

### WIND PROPULSION FOR COMMERCIAL SHIPS

A three-day meeting will be held at the Cunard International Hotel, Hammersmith on 4, 5 and 6 November 1980, sponsored jointly by the Royal Institution of Naval Architects, the Institute of Marine Engineers, the Royal Institute of Navigation and the Nautical Institute, to hear papers on the use of wind propulsion for commercial shipping. The papers, from this country and abroad, cover a wide range of possibilities, from wind-assisted bulk-carriers to kite-assisted propulsion, besides more conventional solutions to the problem of using wind as a form of energy for marine transport.
