**Editorial policy** The *Journal of Linguistics* has as its goal to publish articles that make a clear contribution to current debate in theoretical linguistics. The language of submission and publication is English.

**Preparation and submission of manuscripts** Manuscripts should be formatted as for A4 paper (US 11" × 8.5") with margins of at least 3 cm (1.5") on all four sides, double-spaced and with a 12 pt font. Please note that only papers of no more than 60 double-spaced pages, including references and footnotes, will normally be accepted. If a longer manuscript is submitted for some particular reason, the covering note must state a case for an exception to this limit.

Authors should normally submit the manuscript as a PDF file to the Managing Editor by e-mail, with the main body of the e-mail message containing (i) the name(s) of the author(s) and full contact details; (ii) the full title of the paper; (iii) an abstract of about 200 words summarising the content of the paper; (iv) a statement about the length of the paper in page numbers. The published version of an article includes an abstract; all abstracts are sent to potential referees. While the PDF format is preferred at the time of submission, authors may submit the manuscript in the DOC format. In some cases, authors may be asked to send a hard copy of the submission by post.

For the purpose of refereeing, the electronic copy of an article should be anonymous: the name(s) of the author(s) should not be included in the file and in the file's 'Properties' and, as far as possible, the author(s) should not be identifiable from the references in the text or the acknowledgements. All submitted papers will normally be read by two anonymous referees. The identity of the author(s) of a review article is revealed to the referees but the referees normally remain anonymous.

Accepted papers have to be formatted in accordance with the journal's style and submitted in a file (or files) compatible with PC/Windows XP/MS Word. The journal welcomes articles and book reviews formatted in (La)Tex.

The full set of notes for contributors is available from the journal's web page and from the Managing Editor.

**Proofs** will be presented as PDF files for the authors to correct. In the case of co-authored articles, the proofs will be sent to the first-named author, unless otherwise requested. Please inform the Managing Editor of any relevant changes of e-mail addresses occurring between the submission of the final version of the paper and the expected release of the proofs. The proofs should be corrected within three days of receipt and returned immediately. Detailed proofing instructions will be found with the proof.

Offprints Following publication, all authors will receive a PDF file with their contribution.
