LEGAL SERVICE PLANS: APPROACHES TO REGULATION

By Werner Pfennigstorf and Spencer L. Kimball

This two-year study conducted by the American Bar Foundation under a grant from the National Science Foundation suggests answers to many of the unsettled issues concerning legal service plans that are facing the bar, consumers of legal services, sponsors of legal service plans, legislators, and regulators of such plans.

Prepaid legal service plans are new and complex. There is little experience on which to rely in regulating them. They bring together in a bewildering variety of combinations persons, organizations, and legal relationships that have traditionally been treated separately: the practice of law, labor relations, insurance institutions, and membership relations of many kinds.

These complicated, interwoven relationships are unraveled in the principal reports and background papers presented in *Legal Service Plans: Approaches to Regulation*.

Practicing attorneys and plan sponsors will benefit by gaining a better understanding of legal service plans that will enable them to respond more effectively to the needs of beneficiaries and to anticipate problems, dangers, and regulatory requirements.

Legislators and legal service plan regulators will find the conceptual framework to help them design and administer a system of regulation that protects consumers without discouraging innovation and experimentation in the delivery and financing of legal services.
