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
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Current research in Britain

This research round-up gives an up-to-date overview of UK research activity 1995–1997 in the field of language teaching and learning. The projects listed cover all areas and sectors of education from early language learning to language learning in higher education and vocational language learning. The register also includes expert commentary on the details of research projects received, and papers spelling out the major issues and concerns for contemporary researchers in the UK and further afield.

The book contains:

- descriptions of 205 current research projects in the field of language teaching and learning, including bibliographic references to resulting publications and reports;
- qualitative and quantitative analysis of the survey results by leading researchers;
- details of 171 recently completed postgraduate dissertations and theses;
- a paper by Professor Richard Towell on the issues and challenges facing researchers today;

and draws on the expertise of the CILT Advisory Group on Research.
