The Shelby Cullom Davis Center for Historical Studies at Princeton University announces that the subject of its seminar for the two academic years 1994–1996 will be “Business, Enterprise, and Culture.” The Center invites applications for fellowships or proposals for papers that address the place of business and enterprise from a broadly cultural perspective. A limited number of one- or two-semester research fellowships will be offered, designed for both younger scholars who have finished their dissertations and senior scholars with established reputations. Fellows are expected to live in Princeton for the duration of their award.
