

Editors' Notes

It has been recently announced by the Council on Research in Economic Research that the prize of one thousand dollars currently being offered for the outstanding essay on "Interpreting Long-Term Economic Growth: An Evaluation of Past Attempts and Future Possibilities" is to be known hereafter as the Arthur H. Cole Prize.

As noted in the September 1962 issue of this Journal, essays in the present competition must be postmarked no later than July 15, 1964. Essays, not to exceed 40,000 words, must be in English and should conform to the major literary and stylistic conventions of the JOURNAL OF ECONOMIC HISTORY. Manuscripts should contain no reference to the author's identity, but should be accompanied by an identifying letter. They are to be submitted, in duplicate, to Harold F. Williamson, Secretary, the Council on Research in Economic History, 629 Noyes Street, Evanston, Illinois.

The Arthur H. Cole Prize will be awarded if, in the opinion of the judges, the best essay is an acceptable one. The judges may, at their discretion, divide the prize between two contestants submitting essays of equal merit.

The names of the panel of judges will be announced in the next issue of this Journal.
