This elaboration of the Hersch Lauterpacht Memorial Lectures delivered in November, 1990, deals with a number of controversial issues in the operation of the contemporary system of international justice particularly important in the U.N. Decade of International Law.

Drawing upon his extensive experience of international litigation and his long academic involvement in the subject, the author:

- examines critically the expansion in the number of international tribunals;
- questions, in the light of State practice, the continuing validity of the seemingly axiomatic requirement that jurisdiction may not be exercised without consent;
- assesses the extent to which access to international tribunals should be opened more widely to international organizations, corporations and individuals;
- reviews the desirability of developing the concept of appeals within the international judicial system;
- examines, within the framework of a consideration of the composition of international tribunals, the significance of the growing recourse to Chambers of the International Court of Justice;
- and concludes with a searching analysis of the role of equity in international litigation and, in particular, the need for changes in traditional procedures to take account of the extended discretion of the judiciary.
