

NOTES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

AIMS AND SCOPE

TRaNS approaches the study of Southeast Asia by looking at the region as a place which is defined by its diverse and rapidly-changing social context, and as a place which resists conventional ideas of borders and boundedness. *TRaNS* invites submissions covering political science, anthropology, sociology, history, geography, as well as inter-disciplinary approaches. Studies of trans-national, trans-regional and comparative perspectives or case studies spanning more than two countries of Southeast Asia and its neighbouring countries and regions are particularly invited.

SUBMISSIONS

- Please submit manuscripts using the online *ScholarOne* Manuscript Central website at <<http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/trans>>
- Submitted manuscripts should not have been previously published elsewhere, nor should they be under consideration by any other publisher.

TEXT AND MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

Before a manuscript can be published it must conform to the style of *TRaNS*, a summary of the key points of which is listed below. The comprehensive Notes of Contributors document can be obtained from the Associate Editor (journal@sogang.ac.kr), or from: www.eastasia.kr/eng/journals/International_Journal.aspx.

- *TRaNS* uses UK English.
- Manuscripts should be between 7000 and 9000 words, excluding captions to figures and tables.
- Manuscripts should be prepared in MS Word-compatible software.
- Tables, charts, and graphs may be prepared using the word processor's software facilities.
- For initial submission for the peer review process, tables and low resolution figures may be inserted within the body of the text, or placed on separate pages at the end of the document.
- Wherever possible use black and white or grey-scale charts, illustrations, and figures; the inclusion of colour images will be charged to the author.
- For the format of section headings please refer to recently published papers.
- Footnotes may be used sparingly for important additional information and non-standard sources of data referred to in the article.
- Please do not use endnotes, either for additional information or references.

Abstract

A concise abstract (200 words) is required on submission. Citing references in the abstract should be avoided, but if essential write the author(s) names, year, and full title. Abbreviations should not be included.

Keywords

Provide a maximum of six keywords, avoiding general and plural terms, and multiple concepts.

Referencing

- Please refer to recently published papers and follow the same referencing style.
- Do not use bibliographic software (e.g Endnote or Refworks), but list the references as normal text.
- *TRaNS* uses a parenthetical in-text referencing style, based upon a simplified APA format.
- List multiple in-text references in alphabetical order, separated by a semi-colon.
- Multiple references of the same author should be listed in the bibliography in chronological order, oldest first.
- First and family names of all authors are required in the bibliography.

Peer-review

TRaNS adheres to a double-blind peer review process. Submitted manuscripts will be anonymised before being sent out to two, anonymous, reviewers.
