#### OCCUPATIONAL MENTAL HEALTH

The mental health of people at work, whether manager or bench worker in a factory, doctor or surse in a hospital or surgery, executive or clerk in an office, is obviously of great social and even national mportance. In most years far more days work are ost from psychiatric illness than from strikes; and, pesides, there is considerable loss of efficiency from llness, even when the worker does not go absent. Although the majority of illnesses are probably due to a concatenation of factors, including domestic, there are some conditions in factories and elsewhere that appear to precipitate or predispose to mental ill-health.

It is therefore odd that this subject is so much reglected by many occupational doctors and psychitrists. Voluminous textbooks of occupational meditine spare only a page or two for psychiatric conditions; and psychiatric books and journals are only a little better. The worst example is a recent one, the Robens Report on Safety and Health at Work, which has recently been submitted to the Government.
