The Journal of Asian Studies, known until September 1956 as the Far Eastern Quarterly, is published by the Association for Asian Studies (formerly The Far Eastern Association) in November, February, May, and August. The annual institutional subscription rate for the Journal (including the Bibliography of Asian Studies) is \$80, postage included. Single issues of the Journal and Bibliography published after February 1966 are available through the Secretariat of the Association. Issues published prior to 1966 may be purchased from A.M.S. Reprints, 56 E. 13th Street, New York, New York 10003.

Membership in the Association for Asian Studies, a scholarly, non-political and non-profit organization, is open to all persons interested in Asia and the scholarly study of Asia. Annual membership dues are \$35 for Regular members, \$15 for Retired members, and \$15 for Student members. Student membership is restricted to full-time students for a maximum of five years. Regular, Retired, and Student members receive the Journal of Asian Studies and the Asian Studies Newsletter.

Manuscripts for publication should be submitted to Dr. Barbara Daly Metcalf, Editor, Journal of Asian Studies. Center for South and Southeast Asia Studies, 260 Stephens Hall, University of California, Berkeley, California 94720. It is expected that authors and reviewers will be members of the Association for Asian Studies except for foreign scholars and individuals whose main area of interest is not Asia. Manuscripts should be typed on 8 1/2 × 11 bond, double-spaced. Authors are urged to consult recent issues of the Journal to observe the format for references. Footnotes must be in the form recommended in sections 15.4-15.35 of A Manual of Style, 13th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1982), typed double-spaced, and placed at the end of the manuscript. Manuscripts, including footnotes, should not be more than 40 pages in length. Three copies with text, footnotes, and list of references, all double-spaced, should be enclosed. Because it is impossible to return manuscripts, please do not send the original. All manuscripts submitted to the Journal are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not to be under review elsewhere. After manuscripts have been accepted and edited, authors who have composed them on word processors are encouraged to submit a final version on a diskette.

Books for review and correspondence concerning reviews should be sent to the appropriate editor. Books on Asia General should be sent to the office of the editor. Books on China and Inner Asia should be sent to Professor R. Kent Guy and Professor Elizabeth Perry, School of International Studies, University of Washington, Seattle, WA 98195; books on Japan should be sent to Professor Professor Thomas R. H.
