Copyright is held by The British Institute for the Study of Iraq.

Contributors

Articles can be written in English, French or German. Please submit your manuscript in pdf form in the first instance. For refereeing purposes, your initial submission should have all identifying information (name, institutional affiliation) removed; *IRAQ* uses a double-blind peer reviewing system. In-text citations should use the name-date system of referencing (e.g., Mallowan 1954). Please send your address and email for academic purposes in a separate file or email. These details will be published alongside your article, if accepted.

Articles should not exceed 15,000 words (without prior approval from the Editorial Board), and must include:

- an abstract suitable for translation into Arabic;
- a bibliography or full list of references cited.

Where possible, abbreviations should match those current in *The Assyrian Dictionary of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago*.

Please use a Unicode font if your paper includes special characters such as used in cuneiform transliteration.

Full details about initial and subsequent submissions, including guidance on bibliographic citation, fonts, and image quality, can be found in our Notes for Contributors at https://www.cambridge.org/core/journals/iraq/information/instructions-contributors.

Under the direction of the Editorial Board, all contributions to the journal are peer-reviewed anonymously by members of the board and by selected experts.
